The economy continues to engage a majority in low quality work, which has larger macroeconomic growth repercussions. A vast majority of Indians earn the entirety of their incomes through labour as opposed to ownership of capital or land. Further, about 90% of the working Indian population earns its livelihood through informal employment that is characterised by little or no job security, no employment benefits, no social protection, and lower earnings. The informally employed are primarily concentrated among casual labourers and the self-employed, but exist even in some segments of those who are classified as regular wage or salaried workers.





Avanindra Thakur, focuses on exploring access to institutional credit as one of the main economic parameters for the analysis of the existence and perpetuation of social injustice, particularly in the agriculture domain in Bihar. Addressing inequality through an economic lens, he argue in favour of higher provision of institutional credit in the agriculture sector focused on targeted groups and also suggest strengthening decentralised credit delivery mechanisms in order to make institutional credit more accessible for farmers in Bihar.

Pan-India Stories of Informal Workers During Covid-19 Pandemic: Crisis Narratives



This book delves into the application of feminist ethnography by engaging with the lived experiences of vulnerable workers, factory workers, artisans, small scale entertainment providers and others, who occupy India's informal workforce across its deeply stratified labour-market landscape. Set up in a post pandemic context, the book studies and critically reflects on the vulnerable state of India's workforce, capturing the daily emergencies, livelihood of marginalized communities.

Vulnerable Communities in Neoliberal India Perspectives from a Feminist Ethnographic Approach

This book offer an ethnographic critique of modern, neoliberal India from the perspective of studying the daily lives-livelihoods of marginalised, unsecured, informal vulnerable communities residing in the urban, peri-urban spaces across the nation, including case studies from : pastoralists, fisher-folk, and handicraft workers of Kashmir, weavers of Kutch, and the factory workers and artisans of the Delhi capital.

Delhi Evictions: Reshaping Space, Displacing Lives



Namesh Killemsetty

This study explores the complex interplay between urban development, forced displacement, and global economic forces driving these. This analysis will map demographic shifts in Delhi areas most affected. By engaging with communities displaced or facing imminent eviction, the project aims to capture their narratives and understand the long-term repercussions of evictions on their lives. This study will shed light on the spatial dimensions of urban inequality in Delhi, revealing how evictions not only displace people but also reshape the city's social and economic landscape.

Sidestepping Aarogya Setu: Exploring Non-Adoption in India's Covid-19 Tech Landscape



Vidya Subramanian

This project intends to investigate how digital interventions for health play out in an urban space, by studying the nature of non-adoption of Aarogya Setu. As the Covid-19 pandemic raged on in India, and the use of the app became mandatory in several settings (air travel, entry into some offices, etc), several people did not use the app for reasons of privacy and quality of the app, several others did not use or have cellphones and therefore could not use the app, and yet others simply did not need to use it. The use of this app in a tightly controlled situation such as the Covid-19 lockdown can provide useful insights into the public attitudes in India to the politics of technologies.

Claiming Care, Claiming Equality



Preethi Krishnan

This project examines the Anganwadi as a social reproduction site where inequalities of gender, caste, and class are both reinforced and challenged. The project addresses the question: How does gender, caste and class structures influence how women claim entitlements of care from the state? Ethnographic fieldwork for this project was conducted in Anganwadis in Tamil Nadu. Primary data for this study includes (1) ethnographic notes and observations at the Anganwadis, official meetings, and rallies (2) semi-structured interviews with Anganwadi workers, mothers, Anganwadi union leaders, and state representatives. (3) archival data, including policy documents, training manuals, newsletters, government orders, and documents from the Anganwadi workers union.

Policing Women's Opinions on Social Justice



Poulomi Bhadra

This project explores cyber harassment as a phenomenon at the intersection of (perceived) age, gender, religious, cultural and political identities. The study will be conducted on social media influencers and public figures, activists/advocacy leaders in the digital space who opine on issues of social justice in India. The primary focus of the project will be to study the online experience of women (she/her) SM users particularly to understand the impact on victimization on female victims. (degree of risk perception, access to justice, job opportunities, higher education etc., impact on awareness and usage of legal recourse, attitude and behaviour changes).

Labour Market Inequalities: Undercurrents beneath the Overall Trends



Mrinalini Jha

As part of the project, we are trying to unpack the broad trends in the Indian labour market at the all-India level. Even as the overall, all-India levels and trends are important in themself, the numbers often tend to hide more than they reveal. We focus on different dimensions of household and individual identities to gauge the long-term patterns emerging over time - both in employment and earnings, to elicit data that will help us understand the current labour dynamics.


Colonial Penal Regime and Surveillance of Women's Sexuality



Gagan Kumar

In the year 2018, the Supreme Court of India struck down section 497 of the Indian Penal Code which punished adulterous men for having intercourse with another man's wife. This remarkable judgment shed light on some of the early debates on the formulation of laws on adultery in colonial India and their continuation in the modern period. However, this document doesn't tell us anything about how the laws on adultery were practiced in the frontier regions of India. The project will attempt to show how the colonial discourse on questions of adultery and elopement was different in the northwest frontier region of India from the so-called mainland region. Notably, in Punjab, Sindh, and Baluchistan where Frontier Crimes Regulations were imposed by the British to govern the 'ungovernable', women were considered partners in crime and thus punished for adultery. This paper will examine why this was the case.


